
Here's what to look for in May:

May 1st: Law Day Law

TRIBAL YOUTH COURT

In April, Larissa Fasthorse becomes the first Native American (Sicangu Lakota) woman playwright produced on Broadway with her dark, satirical, humorous play, "The Thanksgiving Play." The play tells the story of four non-Native people attempting to create a culturally sensitive play about the first Thanksgiving for Native American Heritage Month. The play shines an uncomfortable, long overdue light on the celebration of Thanksgiving. Fasthorse says eighty percent of "The Thanksgiving Play" is extracted from actual sentences and scenarios. Fasthorse grew up in South Dakota and began her career in ballet. After an injury took her out of dancing she began working as a writer in film and television. She became frustrated with the inaccurate, offensive portrayal and representation of Indigenous people. At times, she states she felt that she didn't. "have the power to change that." But, she eventually found her place. "The Thanksgiving Play," has won numerous literary and theater awards. It is currently running on Broadway through June. Personally, I hope it makes its way out to California theaters very soon!

Law in the News



The school district says there is a widely-used process that allows students to get permission to deviate from traditional graduation attire. Miss Black claims she was unaware of the request process. The request process requires prior written request and pictures of the item the student wishes to wear, and that nearly 100 students were granted approval for the same graduation ceremony. Miss Black is seeking \$50,000.00 in compensatory and punitive damages, costs and attorney fees. The lawsuit comes as the Oklahoma legislature voted to override Gov. Kevin Stitt's veto of legislation that would allow students to wear tribal regalia during high school and college graduations.

Reservation is governed by a seven
member Tribal Council, which
include a Chairperson, vicechairperson, a secretary, and a
treasurer. Sycuan's Tribal Council
oversees all the business operations
of the Tribe, and ensures the
health, welfare, and safety of its
Tribal members and the
surrounding communities.
